WHAT IS THE KINGDOM OF GOD?

This week we continue our journey through the Gospel of John as we explore the showdown between Jesus and Pilate. Interestingly, John has devoted generous space for this fascinating conversation—one of the longest in the Bible. Doubtless this is because John wants to reveal so much more than the mere facts of the dialogue: for this conversation represents the clash and conflict between the kingdoms of this world and the kingdom of God.

Right in the middle of this account we find Jesus saying,

"MY KINGDOM IS NOT OF THIS WORLD. IF IT WERE. MY SERVANTS WOULD FIGHT TO PREVENT MY ARREST BY THE JEWISH LEADERS. BUT NOW MY KINGDOM IS FROM ANOTHER PLACE." (JOHN 18: 36).

This passage is often misunderstood as if Jesus were saying that the kingdom of God is purely spiritual and has nothing to do with this world, but this would be a mistake. As N.T. Wright explains, when Jesus says, "His kingdom doesn't come from this world." He is not therefore implying "that his 'kingdom' was altogether other-worldly, a spiritual or heavenly reality that had nothing to do with the present world at all." After all Jesus instructed his disciples (and you and me) to pray that the kingdom of God would come and rule over this world as it does in heaven. Jesus was saying that even though the kingdom of God is not from this world, it is nevertheless meant for this world.

Unfortunately, much of Western Christianity has adopted a mostly Platonic view of things to come that creates a radical dualism between the material world and the kingdom of God. Thus, we have inherited talk of 'going to heaven,' as if we are to leave the earth and our bodies behind to be found in a celestial and otherworldly existence. This is a million miles from the meaning of Jesus' words to Pilate.

Jesus had a very Jewish understanding of the kingdom that was all about the restructuring and renewal of this world, which would include everything from our physical bodies and the creation, all the way to the government of this world and how that would work.

When the first Christians began to go out into the world preaching about repentance and the kingdom of God, they had a very material understanding of the kingdom in their minds when they did it. Repentance was a commonly used political term which was a call to political allegiance to a certain king, whom they asserted was Jesus. Even the 'Jesus Christ' is full of political implications for, when rightly understood, it means something like, the true saviour and rightful king of the world.

Let me break this down a little. The name Jesus, in Jewish speak, actually means 'saviour and deliverer,' which in itself is a kingly characteristic. The second half of the name, Christ, is not actually a name at all, but is better understood as a title. Christ literally means 'anointed,' which was how kings were inaugurated in ancient times. Therefore, the title 'Christ,' in this instance, means the one who has been chosen and appointed by God to rule (both the words. Christ and Messiah. are interchangeable designations derived from Greek and Hebrew). We must see these things if we are to properly understand the meaning of the gospel that the first Christians preached.

So then, the essential gospel the first believers preached is this, 'Jesus is the true king of the world, the very one you have been hoping for and waiting for all long, and the proof of this claim is his physical resurrection. Therefore, you

must change your allegiance from all the pretend kings and their false kingdoms and give it to the true king, where you will find your place in his kingdom. There you will discover forgiveness and restoration as a foretaste of things to come by the Holy Spirit'.

With all this in mind the conversation between Jesus and Pilate makes a whole lot more sense, most especially when Jesus says,

"IN FACT, THE REASON I WAS BORN AND CAME INTO THE WORLD IS TO TESTIFY TO THE TRUTH. EVERYONE ON THE SIDE OF TRUTH LISTENS TO ME." (JOHN 18: 37).

Jesus is the true king, who speaks true words and has a true kingdom. Everything else is a lie.


